

## A Rough-legged Hawk off Greenland

Juvenile female Rough-legged Hawk *Buteo lagopus sanctijohannis* corpse, c.55km southwest of Greenland and c.610km east of Baffin Island, September 2001 (*Jens-Kjeld Jensen*). Note the similarities between this bird and the potential Rough-legged Hawks recorded in Europe, including the bird on Iceland in 2000 (see *Birding World* 13: 441 and 14: 439-440 & 448). The plumage is rather plain above, heavily patterned and richly pigmented below, and virtually lacks pale notches in the wing coverts.

On 25th September 2001, a Rough-legged Hawk *Buteo lagopus sanctijohannis* landed on the Faeroese trawler *Arctic Viking* at about 64°30′N 53°05′W, which is *c.*55km southwest of Greenland and *c.*610km east of Baffin Island. Marius Johannesen took the bird into care, but by the next day it had died. Marius stored the corpse in a freezer and showed it to me when the trawler returned to the Faeroe Islands in late April 2002.

This bird immediately reminded me of the presumed Rough-legged Hawks reported in the Western Palearctic in autumn 2001: singles on the Isles of Scilly and in County Galway, Ireland, in October and four in the Azores between

October and December (*Birding World* 14: 439-440, 448 & 15: 18). It was nowhere near so far from the breeding range, of course, but it does seem to provide further evidence that transatlantic vagrancy is a real possibility for last autumn's birds.

My examination of the corpse indicated that it was a juvenile female and I took the following biometrics: weight 750g, wing 440mm, tail 232 mm and culmen 22.4mm.

There is no doubt that Rough-legged Hawks are reaching Europe, but are dark morphs being overlooked as Common Buzzards? One dark morph was found moribund in Iceland on 29th April 1980 (at Fagrahlið i Fljótshlið, Rang). Eds.
